Ben "was the most talked about one of the older Cox Chas

It was the common sense, practical, reasonable
valuable decisions he made - no shoot outs, or acts of
bravado that were told and retold by the fireplace at the
old Cox Home at arroyo Coballs - or Long meadow, or Cox
Canyon, or the old Brown House, or the Trading Post, or
Cox Ford on arroyo la Lucia - It was known by all of
these names as well as many others, Jim B and I am
talking at Chestnutte about all of the stories we heard when
we were growing up, you also wish that we had not got
no more details from the people formerly and others?

who come by to visit and talk and maybe most of
all to get some of these fabulous meals prepared by
"Marty" Jane - my son's favored Grand mother who
called the shots when "the chips were down" White Peter
just stroked his beard and "calculated on the manner in
which to proceed."

In a quiet, firm manner, Benjamin E. Cox, met and tended
with the German Colony at Fredericksburg after Prince Adams had
deserted the Colony, he tended them Corn, wheat, hedes, horses and farm
machinery, Daddles, bridles, raw hide ropes and many other useful
items, that helped the Colony survive through their long hard year

My Uncle Jim Cox told me often about the many kind things
aided by the Germans during his years spent in the 1860's & 70's
when he worked as a team driver with his brother "Blue" Cox - The
"F" the Persuader - old "Cap" Anderson who man... I - 1.

Bexar County Area in 1855 to Lampasas County Area
I told "Please" Acc of the supplies delivered by Benjamin
E. Cox to the defender of the Alamo from October 1835 to
February 26, 1836, the last delivery consisted of about 600
lbs. Shelled Corn, 300 lbs, wheat, 500 lbs of jerked beef and
24 good horses, Many of these supplies were never paid for, the
refusal of Sam Houston to pay for these items used by the
suppliers to the Alamo defender prolonged the ill feelings
that had existed for several years between Solomon Cox and
his family and Sam Houston and his crowd both Tennessee and
Texas as well as in the Arkansas Territory, also in 1830
Solomon Cox and Sam Houston had that famous Debate or argument
concerning the true intentions of Sam Houston and his forces -
See crowd toward Texas - Old I seen Street who operated
Street's Tavern, the place where the debate took place,
in telling his story informed said "Sol Cox a small
man, and well educated in Colon, from which stood face to
face with Sam Houston a Roy of lion, of a man whose

and Utter was well persecuted with malice
and cursing and threats, ~~at~~ the end of the debate Cox
was greeted with louping applause.

Benjamin E. Cox it has been said took no active part in
the Feud between - Houston and Cox - However Benjamin E.
Cox did openly differ with Stephen F. Austin over the treat-
ment of most Texas Settler that a part of Austin own Col-
ony. Cox charged Austin with unfair dealing, & also charged
Austin with favoritism toward David Crockett in particular,

This lead to the forming of the Society of the Friends of
Husbandry June 1834 at Long Meadow in Lancaster County.

Benjamin E. Cox taught a school to the early pioneers in the
best method of preparing for self defense of the Settler. He also
organized the first Loring Party or Company in 1817-18.

In later years he headed Reson Parker with food and arms
to Comanche County - A deep thumping - level flooded ma-
rine much to Texan - In return he received little.
