WHEREAS, There is a suit pending in the District Court of Williamson County, State of Texas, wherein *The State of Texas is*

Plaintiff and *Blueford, Leo et al are*

Defendant; And, whereas, it is represented that *Thomas Howell, Mort Store*

Went Howell, William Bowen & Rufus Overstreet of said county of *Lampasas* and State of *Texas* are material witness, for the *State of Texas*

in said cause, and cannot attend our said court without manifest inconvenience; and direct ~~interrogatories~~ interrogatories having been propounded to said witness and filed in said court: Now, therefore, know you that we, reposing special confidence in you, do hereby

authorize and empower you to cause the said witnesses *above named*

at such time and place as you may appoint, and after swearing *them* that the "evidence *they* shall give in said cause shall be the truth, the whole truth and nothing but

the truth," to proceed as follows:

- 1st. State said cause as in the caption of the interrogatories.
- 2nd. Propound to said witness each direct ~~interrogatory~~ interrogatory and reduce answers to writing in proper form, and cause *them* to subscribe *their* names

thereto.
3d. Certify under your hand and seal of office that said answers were sworn to and subscribed before you.

4th. Envelope said answers, together with this commission and the copy of Interrogatories; seal the envelope; write your name *officially* across the seal; endorse on the package the *names* of the parties to said suit and the name of the witness; direct said package to "The Clerk of the District Court of Williamson county, Georgetown, Texas."

5th. Deliver said package to the Post Master and cause him to write on the envelope thus: "Received this package from _____ the officer before whom the written answers were taken," and to sign his name *officially* thereto.

These instructions you will in no wise omit, but make due return of this Commission in pursuance thereto.



Clark, in Lampasas County Tex. about the 15th of June 1873. I don't know whether he ever lived in ^{Hamilton} Lampasas County or not;

To the sixth Interrogatory he answers. I know Harry Clark, who lived in Lampasas County in November, 1873, have known him since about the 15th day of June 1873.

To the seventh Interrogatory he answers: Ben Horrell was in Coleman County Tex. on the 24th of April 1873, between the 24th & 28th of April 1873 he was on the road between Coleman County to Lampasas County, in company with me Wm Bowen, and Merit Horrell.

To the eighth Interrogatory he answers, William Bowen was with me, and Ben Horrell, and William Merit Horrell in Coleman County Tex. on the 24th of April 1873, and between the 24th & 28th of said month was on the road between Coleman & Lampasas County

To the ninth Interrogatory he answers. I know Ben Horrell and William Bowen did not meet Bluford Cox in Lampasas County Tex between

The 24th & 25th of April 1873, and
kill him soon, my reasons for knowing
is, that I was with both Benson
and William Bowen, on the 24th 25th
26th & 27th of said month, and was
with W^m Bowen, through the entire
month of April 1873.
