

Cousin Carolyn Cox Williams recently had dinner with not one but two former Lampasas Cox reunion guest speakers: Monte Monroe and Jimmy Peet.

The meeting took place at the Texian Navy Day celebration on September 21, 2024 in the Galveston Ship Channel.

Monte Monroe, the current Texas State Historian, had been the guest speaker at the 2024 Lampasas reunion back in June. He had sat across from Carolyn and her sister Janice Cox Jenkins for the Saturday noon meal, where they'd discussed the Texas Navy Association (TNA). That discussion led to them meeting again, for Monte's part of these Texian Navy Day festivities was his being commissioned as an Admiral. DNA Project Report

Current Status of yDNA Project

We currently have 28 BigY DNA testers in the Brandywine subgroup, up two testers since my last report. Using the results from these tests along with the excellent research of Claudia Davenport I presented a hypothesis on how these men are related at this summer's Brandywine reunion. My slides can be found in [the Brandywine Crucible web archives](#). Details of Claudia's research can be found on the WikiTree page maintained by Edie Kohutec, Lee Bain, and Suzanne Hye (<https://www.wikitree.com/wiki/Cox-578>).

Below is the family group sheet for William Cox (instead of Thomas Cox-Christian Matthews as previously hypothesized), whom I believe is the first immigrant of our family to North America. The paw prints indicate direct ancestors of our yDNA testers, which you can see covers all 4 sons of William.

The identity of the parents of Solomon Cox, Sr. is not yet clear. At the reunion, Steve Tayler summarized the two current hypotheses regarding Solomon's parents:

Either John, Sr. (see family group sheet on page 2) or his son John, Jr., husband of Mary Harlan. I have nothing more to report on this topic, and will instead focus on questions regarding lines that descend from Solomon Cox, Sr.

Many yDNA Testers Have Yet to be Connected to Our Tree

Depicted below is the current time tree for our BigY testers along with distant parts of the lines of our testers.

Recall that yDNA mutations (haplotypes) arise on average eve-


ry three generations. Haplotypes can only be identified when descendants of two sons of the ancestor in which the haplotype arose are tested. In our tree, the only son of William that we assigned a haplotype to is John, Jr. (Descendants of sons Solomon and Samuel fall in the same haplotype.) We know that no haplotype arose in son William because the descendants of different brothers of his son Harmon formed a haplotype (R-FT52977) that is not shared by Harmons brother Thomas (in top gray box). If a haplotype had arisen in William all three testers would have shared a haplotype, not shared by other testers.

The gray boxes highlight testers in which either another tester from a sibling line is needed or in which no additional mutations have arisen between the tester and the haplotype he descends from. The only example of the latter is *Stephen, Sr. > John 1800 (? Story). This tester has no unique mutations.

Searching for New Lines in Our Family

You will notice in the time tree that we still have many testers that have brick walls, many of which descend from John. Further research is needed to help connect these testers to the Cox family

tree. The likely reasons for some of these brick walls is an incorrect connection of a line to our tree or new Cox lines that have yet to be discovered. A few years ago, I suggested that William Henry Cox, whose descendants landed in Uvalde, Texas, belonged in our tree. We were able to verify that this line descends from John through a yDNA test from one of his descendants but have yet to confidently connect this line to the tree.

A Potential New Cox Line

I would like to share with you another line that I believe should be connected to our Cox tree. This new line begins at a Christopher Cox born in 1799 in Virginia (see family group sheet to the right). His parents are currently not known.

We have two people (mother and daughter) that descend from Christopher's line through his daughter Margaret in our GEDmatch Quaker Cox Project (currently totaling 314 members). These testers are members of a large triangulated group on chromosome 21 that includes myself and 11 members of our project (not including the other descendent of Christopher). Numerous other testers also match these two testers on other chromosomes.

Using the tools at Ancestry and FamilyTreeDNA, I searched for matches from other descendants of Christopher to testers that have shared access to their DNA matches with me. So far, I have found additional testers (11 total) that have matches to Christopher's descendants. These testers are distributed across all of Solomon's sons. I have found five matches to myself and descendants of both Margaret and Mary. Since Solomon Cox/Naomi

Hussey are my 5th great grandparents, I hypothesize that Christopher descends from Solomon and Naomi.

Christopher was married to Martha Pope on August 16, 1821 in Bartholomew County, Indiana. I have yet to find him in a census prior to 1850, so have been looking at the locations where the sons of Solomon, Sr. were found between 1820 and 1850. This task has been challenging because I found that the head count

of children on many of the pre-1850's censuses that I have assigned to these men do not always add up. Either I have chosen the wrong census for Solomon's sons or we don't have a complete and accurate listing of their children.

One interesting finding was the wife of Christopher, Martha Pope, is the niece of Mary Serginer Pope, wife of Joseph Cox. Joseph is the grandson of William Cox/Catherine Kinkey. A further connection is found in the nice write-up that our cousin Deb Cavel posed on WikiTree regarding the wives of Solomon, Jr. (<https://www.wikitree.com/wiki/Cox-12867>). Deb has proposed that Solomon Cox, Jr. married Julyatha Cox (rather than Martha Dixon), who is the sister of Joseph Cox above. She does make a compelling case and makes me need to rethink the family of Solomon, Jr., my 4th great grandparent.

I will end the story here as I need to do further research into this topic. The take-away message that I hope that you get is that we still are a long way from understanding even the more recent connections in our family tree.
